

## DISASTER CHECKLIST

- Enough water (one gallon per person per day), food, medicine, and other supplies in your home to meet needs for at least three days (don't forget your pets!)
- One change of clothing and footwear per person.
- One blanket or sleeping bag per person.
- A first aid kit including prescription medicines.
- List of doctors, emergency personnel and friends or relatives who should be notified if you are injured.
- Emergency tools and supplies including a battery-powered NOAA weather radio, a portable radio, flashlight, mosquito repellent, sunscreen, a non-electric can opener, and a supply of batteries.
- An extra set of car keys and cash.
- Insurance policy, including agent's name and telephone number, and any other important family documents in water-proof containers.

During emergencies, monitor local media for up-to-date information.

## BE PREPARED!

Hurricanes are dangerous tropical cyclones. Their winds reach a constant speed of at least 74 mph and may gust up to 200 mph. Hurricanes can cover several hundred miles and can generate torrential rains and tornadoes. The eye of a hurricane is misleadingly calm. When the eye passes over your area, only half the storm has passed — the rest is yet to come. The wind will return suddenly from the opposite direction.

The most dangerous part of a hurricane is the storm surge which can cause 90 percent of hurricane-related deaths. Due to its proximity to Biscayne Bay, Pinecrest is susceptible to the effects of the storm surge and residents in certain areas may have to evacuate in cases of a strong storm.

Knowing what to do when a hurricane is approaching is the best possible protection you and your family can have. Keep this booklet handy before, during and after the hurricane and use it as a reference guide for the safety of your family and home.

## STORMS AND WARNINGS

**Tropical Depression:** A disturbance with a clearly defined low pressure area and wind speeds as high as 38 mph.

**Tropical Storm:** A distinct low pressure area defined by a counter-clockwise rotating circulation with winds of 39-73 mph.

**Hurricane:** A warm-core tropical cyclone in which the maximum sustained surface winds are 74 mph or greater.

**Tropical Storm Watch:** An alert that tropical storm conditions may pose a threat to a specific area within 36 hours.

**Tropical Storm Warning:** An alert that tropical storm conditions are expected in a specific area within 24 hours.

**Hurricane Watch:** An alert that hurricane conditions may pose a threat to a specific area within 36 hours.

**Hurricane Warning:** An alert that hurricane conditions may pose a threat to a specific area within 24 hours.
